Feedback for Moving Forward

Feedback on learners' work can be one of the most influential ways to create improvement, according to research ... but to have this outcome, feedback needs to be given skilfully. In this talk, we will look at why formative feedback is so important, who can give it when and, most crucially, some varied and effective ways of responding to our learners' work. We will explore several activities that incorporate feedback on language and skills work.







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Developing Students' Speaking Skills

What makes conversation sound "natural"? What are "speaking skills" and how can we help our students to speak "naturally"? What does a "speaking skills lesson" look like? This session will answer these questions and equip you with a series of engaging activities that you can use with your adult and teenage classes.

Clear Instructions, I Seek You!

A workshop on the reasons behind asking questions and considering Instruction Checking Questions (ICQs) when planning your instructions. We will discuss how useful a tool they can be if teachers want to make sure their students know WHAT to do by checking their understanding of what IS EXPECTED of them.

Grammar Fun with Young Learners

English grammar practice doesn't have to be just boring or must-be part of young learners' lessons. It can be turned into fun, that children are looking for. This workshop presents a set of classroom activities that help to memorize and visualize grammar structures and make it easy for children to learn. For better understanding the presentation includes some examples from real lessons. The activites are best used with students aged 6 - 14 and are suitable also for exam preparation (YLE).

Spelling Myths and Enchantments (10:15)

Everybody seems to have something to say about English spelling ... or the teaching of it. But how much of that talk is really true? And how much of it provides teachers with practical solutions to the problems of students who struggle with spelling but can't pass their exams without it? Not much, unfortunately! In this seminar we will explore some common myths about our spelling and how we can really help learners improve – even those who seem a long way off mastery. We will look at some multi-sensory activities that you can use with learners of any age.

"Keeping it Real: Using and Adapting Authentic Materials."

Students of all ages respond well to authentic materials in the classroom, but it's not always easy to adapt the materials to different situations. In this workshop, we will look at adapting a wide range of real-life materials for the language classroom, from young learners to buisness classes.

Cambridge Exams: New and Noteworthy

The purpose of this presentation is to give the latest update information about Cambridge English Qualifications and provide an overview of the changes in Key and Preliminary exams in 2020. During this session we will talk about the Cambridge English Scale and further resources for teachers.









Can Writing be Fun?

Writing, in any language, can be fun. Everyone enjoys describing events in their lives, talking about pictures and places, and sharing their thoughts and ideas. So, can we, as teachers, help our young learners develop this type of enthusiasm for sharing and writing in English? Yes, we can. We need to provide them with interesting, engaging and challenging tasks. They need realistic reason to write...

Doing Crafts with Young Learners (13:30)

This workshop is aimed at YL teachers who don't have that much – or any - experience doing crafts with YLs and might be afraid of trying it out, as well as experienced teachers who want to get some new ideas. In this workshop, I will look at reasons for including crafts in your lessons, how to do it, possible problems and solutions, and lots of ideas for crafts that you can do with your students. I will focus mainly on doing crafts with YLs (6-12-year-olds), however, some activities can be adapted for younger or older students based on their abilities.
